

To celebrate a year of our New York outpost, we've curated a local guide for the city so you can plan your visit like a local.

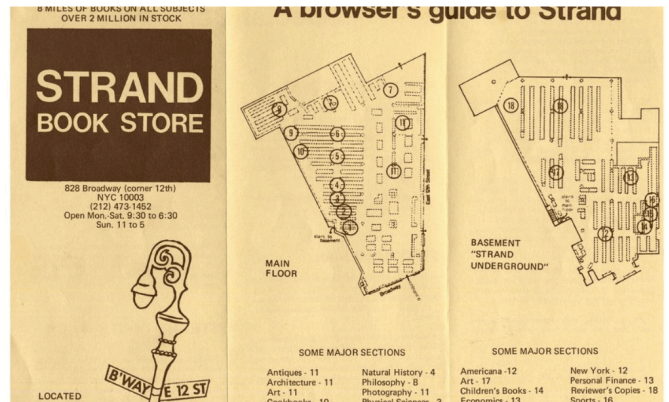

UNION SQUARE GREENMARKET

A few days a week, New Yorkers flock to Union Square to enjoy the best of countryside pleasures in the Big Apple. Think free-range eggs, organic produce, small-batch preserves, fresh flowers, and artisan cheeses. Even if you're not doing a weekly shop, it's worth swinging by to grab a pastry, enjoy the live music from street performers, and explore what's on offer.



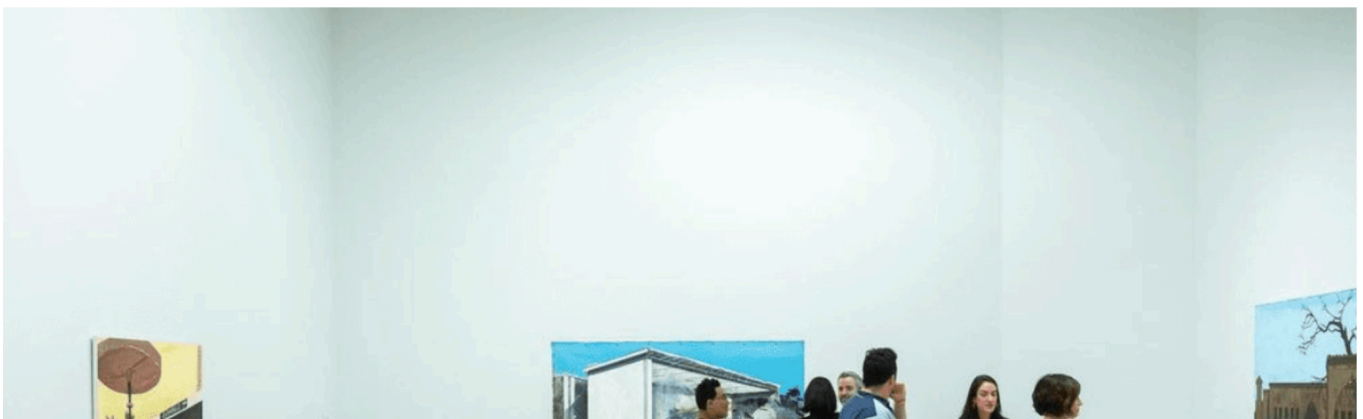
STRAND BOOK STORE

A short stroll downtown will take you to New York's most beloved independent bookstores. The Strand features an impressive and varied selection of new, used, and rare books to explore, plus a roster of bookish events and talks. If you're looking for a non-touristy memento of the city to bring home with you, look no further than this literary institution.



RUMBLE

A stone's throw from 1170 Broadway is the Rumble Boxing Gym, a favourite for high-intensity group boxing classes in the city. Get your heart rate pumping as you rotate between the floor (weights) and bags, with encouraging instructors, nightclub-esque lighting and epic playlists. You may even spot a familiar face from The Ned in class!





WHITNEY MUSEUM OF AMERICAN ART

If you're in the mood for experiencing world-class art, visit the Whitney Museum of American Art on the city's West side, between the High Line walkway and the Hudson river. Explore the iconic building, designed by architect Renzo Piano, and enjoy twentieth century and contemporary American art. Reserve timed-entry tickets online and check out the Whitney's website for a list of guided tours.
